## **Census 2021**

The next Census will take place on 21 March. The Census provides a snapshot of our society and responses to the questions help shape policy, allocate resources, plan services and monitor equality.

You'll soon see advertisements on the TV and in newspapers, and towards the end of February a postcard will be delivered to your home to remind you that the Census is happening.

At the beginning of March, you will receive an Information Pack in the post which will tell you all you need to know about completing the Census form. Remember, you complete one form per household.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on

sexual orientation and gender identity. Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

#### A Digital First Census

You'll be able to complete the form online, but if you don't have your own computer (or tablet or smartphone) you can ask a family member or someone else you trust to help you complete it. If you'd prefer to fill in a paper form, the Information Pack will tell you how to ask for one. Some households will receive a paper form automatically, this can also be completed online if you wish.

You can start to complete the form as soon as you get it, but you should complete it no later than 21 March.

Please don't worry about filling in the form. You can get help from a dedicated Census Help Line (the number will be available in your information pack) where they can assist you with completion over the phone. As well as advisor support and webchat, they also offer a text relay service.
