HUG IN A MUG

Mocha

Makes 1, Ready in 5 mins, plus cooling. 2 tbsp soft light brown sugar 2 tbsp plain flour 1 tbsp cocoa powder ¹/₄ tsp baking powder 1 medium egg 2 tbsp expresso or double-strength coffee, cooled to room temperature. 1 tbsp chocolate chips ¹/₂ tbsp icing sugar 2 tbsp double cream

In your mug mix together the sugar, flour, cocoa, and baking powder using a fork. Add the egg, oil, and 2 tbsp of the coffee and mix until just smooth. Gently stir the chocolate chips into the top half of the batter. Microwave for 1 min 10 secs, or until risen and spring to the touch. Set aside to cool for 10 mins.

In a small bowl, combine the remaining 1 tbsp of coffee with the icing sugar and cream, and whisk until the cream forms soft peaks. Dollop a large spoonful of the coffee cream on to your cake and enjoy.
