The Giver of Stars. by JoJo Moyes

Dec 1937 in Kentucky this book is based on the horseback librarians who delivered books in the Appalachian Mountains after The President and Mrs Roosevelt made efforts to reduce illiteracy after the Depression by funding a travelling library.

Margery O'Hare was riding alone through the forest to deliver library books when she was confronted by a drunk man with a gun, to defend herself she strikes him with a book and manages to escape.

Alice van Cleve newly married to the son of the local coal mining owner volunteers to join Margery and the horseback library ladies despite disapproval from her husband.

Margery was arrested and tried for the murder of the drunk Clem McCulloch when his body was found after the ice melted in the Spring.

However, everything changes after the daughters of the drunken man give new evidence to the judge.

The title of the book comes from a book of poetry - The Giver of Stars by Amy Lowell.

The WPA horseback library ran from 1935 to 1943 and brought books to a hundred thousand inhabitants - East Kentucky is one of the poorest places in the USA. We all enjoyed this book based on real events.

## COURGETTE, POTATO & CHEDDAR SOUP

500g potato, unpeeled and roughly chopped.
2 vegetable stock cubes
1kg courgettes, roughly chopped.
bunch spring onion, sliced – save 1 for
serving, if eating straight away
100g extra mature cheddar – grated, plus a
little extra to serve.

good grating fresh nutmeg, plus extra to serve.

#### STEP 1

put potatoes in a large pan with just enough water to cover them and crumble in the stock cubes. Bring to boil then cover and cook for 5 mins. Add courgettes, put the lid back on and cook for 5 mins more. Throw in the spring onions, cover and cook for a final 5 mins.

#### STEP 2

take off the heat, then stir in the cheese and season with the nutmeg, salt and pepper. Whizz to a think soup adding more hot water until you get the consistency you like. Serve scattered with extra grated cheddar, spring onions and nutmeg or pepper.
