#### **Book Club**

The Dry - A thriller and murder mystery written by Jane Harper

This story is set in Australia in the grip of the worst drought in a century - is hasn't rained in the small country town of Kiewarra for two years. No rain meant no feed - no feed meant the animals died and businesses failed. Tensions become unbearable when three members of the Hadler family are murdered. Luke Hadler is accused of the murder and then of committing suicide after killing his wife and six-year-old son. Policeman Aaron Falk returns to his hometown for the funeral of his childhood friend Luke and is unwillingly drawn into the investigation. Questions and suspicions mount and Aaron is forced to confront the community that rejected him 20 years earlier when a young girlfriend of his Ellie was found dead in a river. Aaron and Luke shared a secret - an alibi for the death of Ellie and as he probes deeper into the killings, secrets from the past bubble to the surface.

The book describes the harsh conditions the community endure as the river dries up and businesses fold and how farmers have a constant struggle to care for their stock and land. A few red herrings led the reader to suspect various characters when a casual conversation with the landlord in the local Pub gave Aaron the information to uncover the truth.

A large huntsman spider was mentioned several times through the book which most members enjoyed reading.
